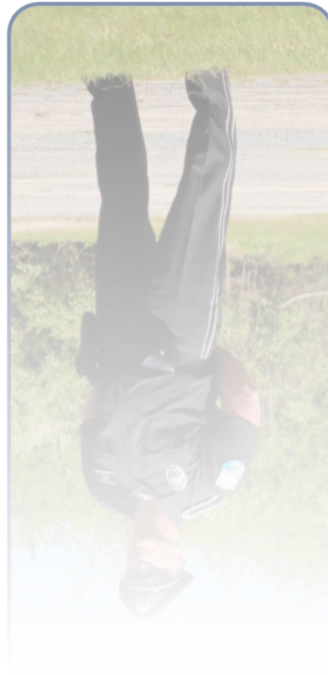

Chief's Message

This annual report serves as a short summary of the varied activities within the police department during the previous calendar year. Compiling an annual report allows agency leaders and managers an additional opportunity to review and critique the agency's performance and efficiency. It aids us in determining whether we are succeeding in meeting our annual goals and objectives. An annual report helps the police department communicate the overall vision and mission to the community while at the same time providing for transparency and offering useful information to citizens and public officials.

The 2019 Annual Report identifies our agency's inner workings, presents some statistical analysis of police and emergency service activities, and describes many of our initiatives and community policing endeavors. We are proud of our strong community based policing model and our problem solving focus. This year the agency was fortunate to make several capital improvements to our infrastructure. We were able to upgrade police vehicles, purchase new ballistic vests for our sworn police officers, upgrade mobile data terminals and desktop computers and replace an aging animal control van with a newly equipped all-wheel drive vehicle. We applied grant and seizure funding toward the purchase of necessary investigative equipment and we are currently in the process of implementing a comprehensive security upgrade to several Town owned buildings and facilities.

In the year 2019, the department was proud to welcome several new, highly qualified employees to our ranks. During this time, we also retired or wished well to several veteran members that moved on to other endeavors. Maintaining a team of highly qualified personnel can be challenging, and department staffing is constantly in flux. Our police department is rapidly becoming one of Rhode Island's most highly sought after professional law enforcement agencies from which to seek a career and serve the public.

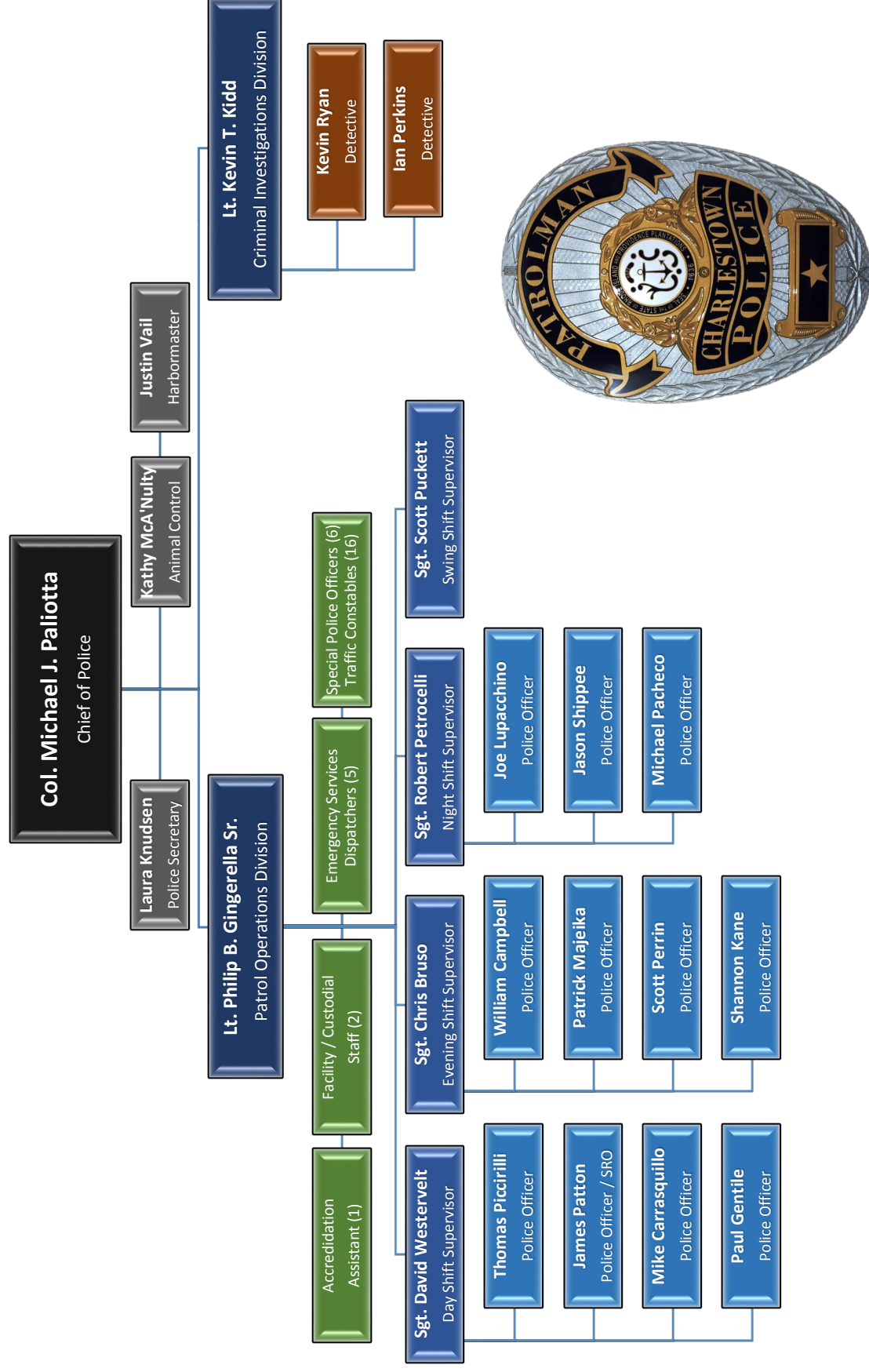

Patrol Operations Division

The Patrol Operations Division is comprised of one (1) Lieutenant, four (4) Sergeants, eleven (11) Police Officers, six (6) part-time Special Police Officers, five (5) Emergency Dispatchers, sixteen (16) part-time Traffic Constables, one (1) part-time Accreditation Assistant and two (2) part-time Maintenance Personnel. The Patrol Operations Division Commander oversees the entire compliment of uniformed police officers, emergency dispatching personnel, buildings and grounds staff and part-time traffic control / event staff. The division oversees agency grants, department training, fleet maintenance and the agency's RIPAC accreditation program.

In 2019, the Charlestown Police Department logged 16,459 total calls for service, a slight decrease in activity experienced in 2018. Of the total calls for service, officers conducted 274 arrests, 224 motor vehicle accidents and 624 offense investigations. The agency made contact with over 3600 motorists while conducting traffic enforcement operations, issuing warnings in more than 75% of all cases. Additionally, the department's red light camera enforcement program aided the agency in identifying over 1700 traffic law violators in 2019. Our red light camera program allows us the ability to use the latest technology as a force multiplier for the department. This reduces the man hours and physical resources necessary to effectively enforce red light traffic laws at two high risk intersections on Post Road. In 2019, the agency upgraded the existing camera technology at these intersections to include improved license plate reader technology (LPR) that will aid the department in criminal investigations and its ability to locate high priority wanted vehicles more efficiently and effectively.

Historically, the highest demand on uniformed police services occurs in the summer months of May, June, July, August and September. Once again, this year was no different and demand on agency resources was high during those months. The entire agency's staff met this demand well and served the Town in a professional, courteous and compassionate manner.

Residents and visitors alike should feel proud and confident that their police department is prepared, equipped and trained to continue to provide the highest quality law enforcement services to the community of Charlestown.

Criminal Investigations Division

Division Commander

The Criminal Investigations Division of the department is specially designed to handle all follow-up investigations and serious cases. The division is specially equipped to dedicate manpower and resources to investigate vice, narcotics, and other major felony and misdemeanor incidents. The Lieutenant in charge of the division is responsible to oversee the agency's prosecution function and works closely with the Town's solicitors and the Rhode Island Department of Attorney General. This division represents the Town in each of five (5) court systems to include the Rhode Island Superior and District Courts, Juvenile Court, Rhode Island Traffic Tribunal and the Charlestown Municipal Court. In addition, the Criminal Investigative Division handles the agency's sex offender registrations, crime scene processing, evidence and property functions, case discoveries, records requests and records retention.

The Criminal Investigations Division of the Charlestown Police Department is staffed by three (3) full-time sworn police officers. The division is comprised of one (1) Lieutenant serving in the capacity of division commander, and two (2) Detectives as criminal investigators. In addition, the division utilizes one (1) full-time civilian police secretary that, among other duties, handles agency payroll, purchasing, records requests and scheduling.

Each year the Criminal Investigative Division investigates several suspicious deaths and suspected drug overdoses, fatal motor vehicle accidents, major felony crimes to include sexual assault, burglaries and robberies, complicated DUI accidents, wanted persons and more. In 2019 the division continued to train its staff in the latest investigative techniques and technologies and worked closely with other federal, state and local law enforcement partners to keep Charlestown safe.

Members of the Criminal Investigations Division work administrative schedules designed to maximize their availability during peak hours of agency demand. All Detectives receive specialized training in the most modern criminal investigative techniques which includes BCI crime scene investigation and processing, evidence collections and storage, interview and interrogation techniques, police photography, narcotics investigation, cyber-crime, financial crimes and other related fields.

Support Services



Justin Vail - Harbormaster

The Charlestown Harbormaster is responsible for the Town's harbor management and marine patrol program. This marine unit is comprised of three (3) town officials that are overseen by the Chief of Police. It includes one (1) Harbormaster and two (2) Assistant Harbormasters, each responsible to patrol and enforce regulations on the Town's two large coastal salt ponds, breach-ways and assorted waterways. They are charged with providing boating safety education, conducting marine patrols, working closely with state and federal agencies on harbor and boating issues, and implementation of the Town's Harbor Management Plan. Harbormasters work closely with sworn police personnel to provide a variety of services to the residents and visitors of Charlestown. Other duties include the issuing and maintaining of mooring permits and fees, and maintaining the municipality's boating and docking assets.



Kathy McA'Nulty – Animal Control Officer

The Charlestown Animal Control is a unit that works in conjunction with the Charlestown Police Department and is responsible for all domestic animal related issues in Charlestown. The unit is supervised by Animal Control Officer Kathy McA'Nulty. Ms. McA'Nulty oversees the animal shelter staff and the volunteers who care for the safety and welfare of the animals under Town control. The Charlestown Animal Control Officer is an integral part of the Charlestown Police Department team.

Significant Calls for Service

Fugitive Search

On June 23rd, 2019 the Attleboro Massachusetts Police Department sent out a regional broadcast to all Southern New England Police Departments to be on the lookout for a murder suspect who had reportedly killed his ex-girlfriend in Attleboro the evening before. The suspect, Steven Fregeolle was reported to be armed and dangerous and his current location was unknown.

At approx. 12:00 pm, Charlestown Police Sergeant David Westervelt pulled into the parking area of the Francis Carter Memorial Preserve on Route 112 to do a routine area check. As he pulled into the preserve, he observed Fregeolle's vehicle parked in the lot. He immediately called for assistance and mutual aid from area police departments. Fregeolle was not in his vehicle and he was believed to be armed and on foot somewhere in the Preserve. Approximately 5 hours after Fregeolle's vehicle was located, a police search team found his body. Fregeolle had taken his own life approximately 1/2 mile into the woods. During the incident, the Code Red system was used to send information to residents in a radius around the incident.

Twenty five (25) State and local agencies assisted Charlestown Police with the search for Fregeolle including 52 Police Officers and 3 K-9 teams. Charlestown Police were grateful for the overwhelming response by our public safety partners who helped bring a safe conclusion to a dangerous situation.

Westerly Police Assistance

On December 19th, 2019 Charlestown Police became aware of an active shooter incident in neighboring Westerly, Rhode Island. Without hesitation, six (6) Charlestown Police Officers were immediately dispatched to the scene in Westerly to provide assistance. Charlestown Police Officers assisted with shutting down the roads into the scene and establishing a perimeter.

For several hours, the gunman's location was unknown and Charlestown Police along with several other local police agencies, continued to hold a perimeter around the area and operate several roadblocks in and out of the scene. The gunman was eventually found dead in his apartment and Charlestown Police Officers assisted with re-opening area roads and returning the immediate area to normal. Charlestown Police were glad we could offer assistance in our neighbor's time of need.

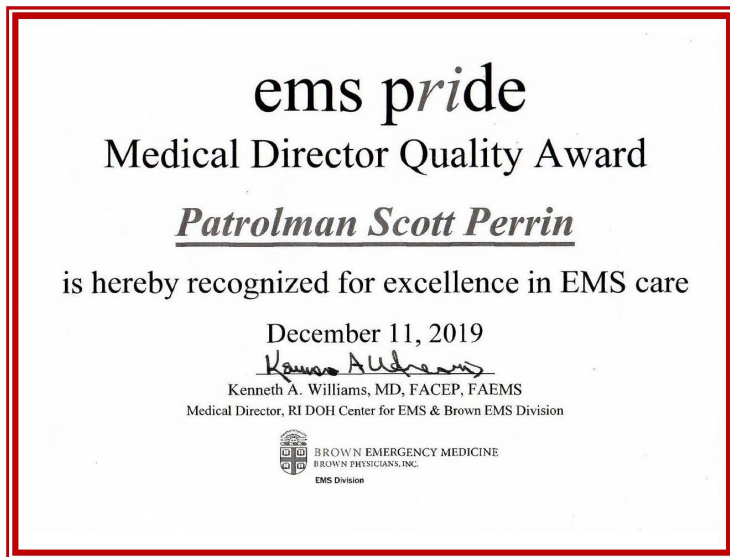
DUI Enforcement / Accident Investigations

During the calendar year 2019, the Charlestown Police Department investigated approximately twenty (20) incidents of suspected drug overdose. Twelve (12) of these incidents resulted in Narcan deployment saves by Police Officers. Unfortunately six (6) overdoses resulted in untimely deaths. The agency also began to take part in the State's Hope Initiative in an effort to combat opioid overdoses. In addition, the agency made thirty one (31) arrests of drivers operating while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs on our roadways.

The department also investigated three (3) fatal motor vehicle accidents within the Town's geographical boundaries and assisted in several mutual aid investigations which included an airplane crash on Watchaug Pond. During 2019 the department carried through on its initiative to crack down on the possession and use of illegal fireworks. We conducted a media campaign to educate the public on illegal fireworks, we made several arrests for possession of illegal fireworks, and then assisted federal and state agents in a large seizure of over \$10,000 of commercial grade pyrotechnics from Charlestown.

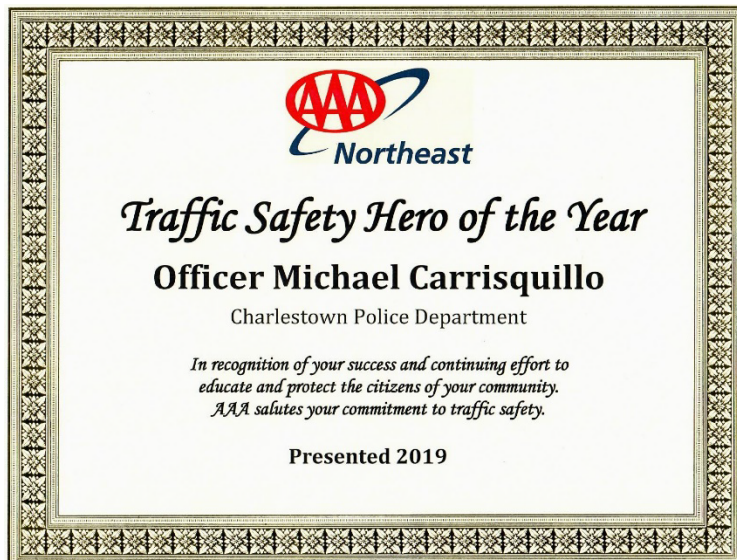

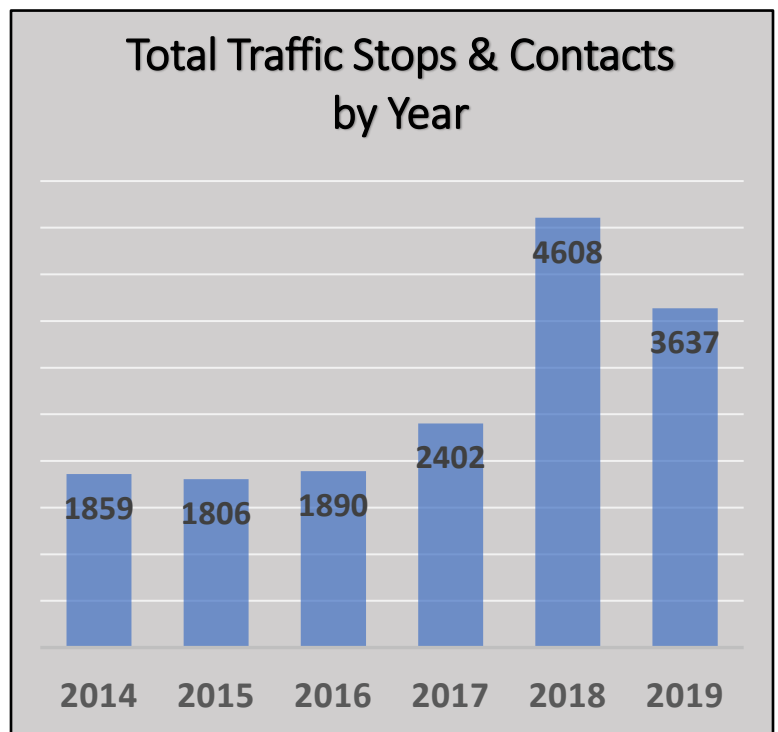
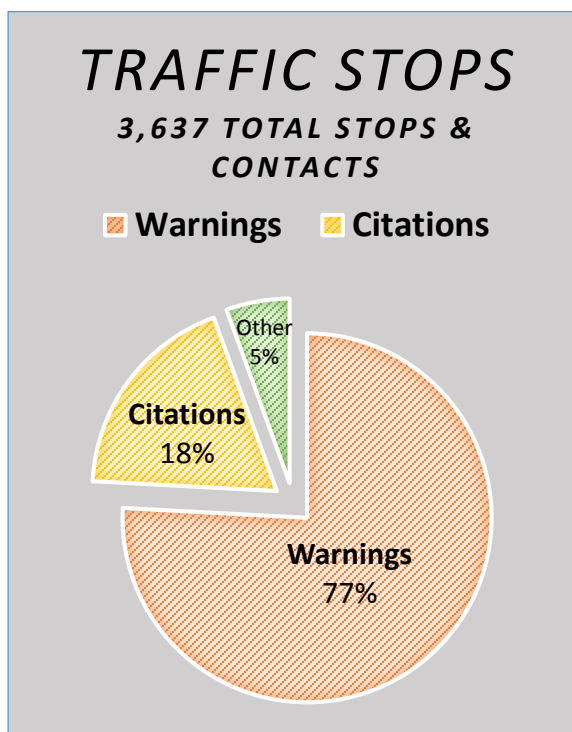
All agency internal complaints were investigated and reviewed by the department's administration in 2019. All three (3) resulted in minor disciplinary action with no further action needed.

Traffic Enforcement

The Charlestown Police Department takes highway traffic safety very seriously. Excessive speed and obedience to traffic control devices were some of the top violations issued again in 2019. Charlestown Police Officers stopped and/or made contact with 3,637 vehicles for various traffic offenses during the year. The Charlestown Police Department also uses our three (3) portable traffic trailers and two (2) electronic speed signs to monitor and educate motorists at various locations around town, especially during summer months where we experience an increase in traffic.

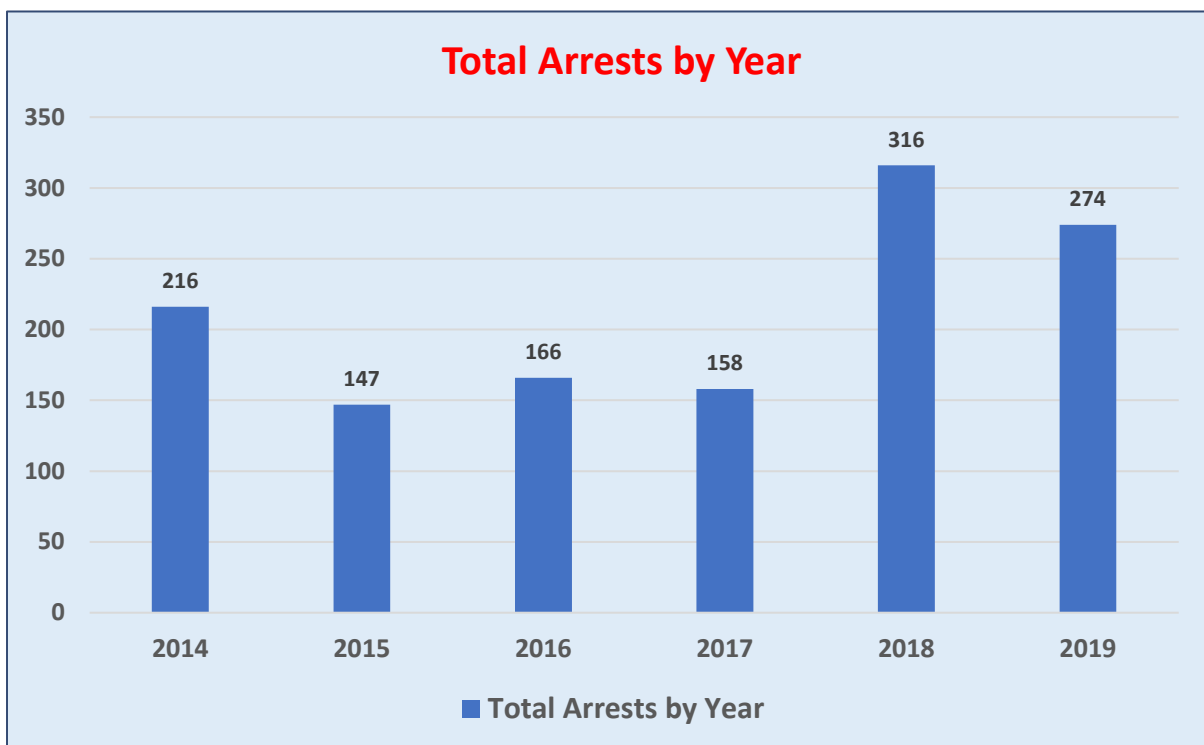

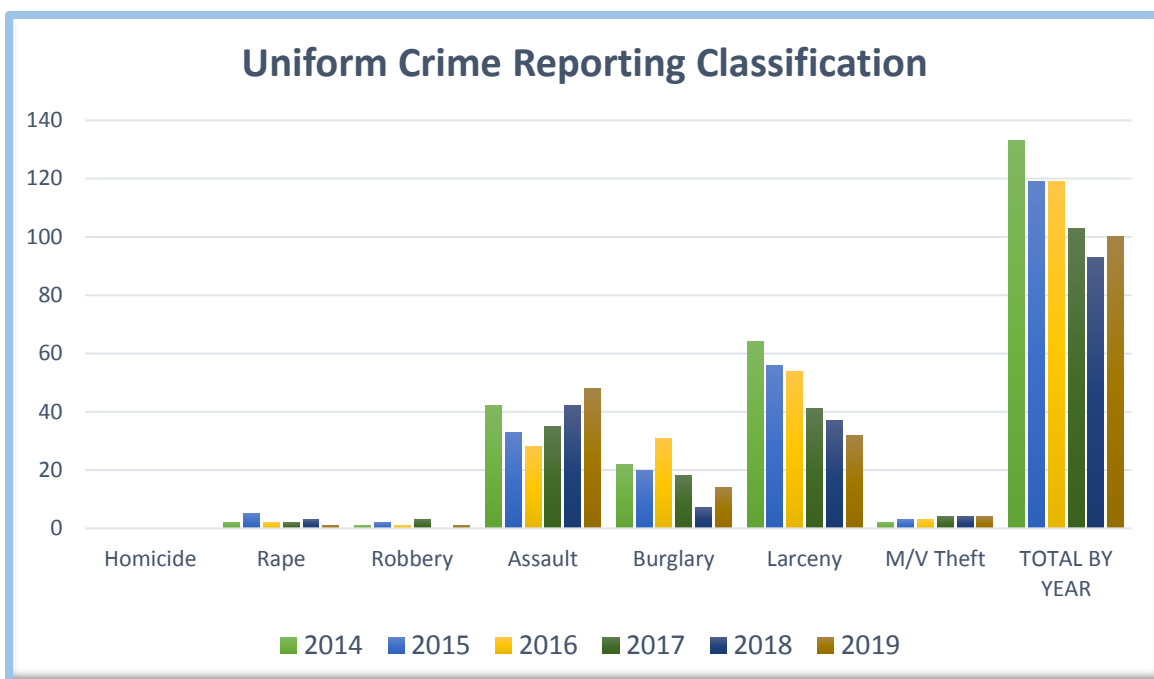

Uniform Crime Report Data

The Uniform Crime Report (UCR) is a monthly reporting mechanism by which each law enforcement agency in the country is required to communicate crime data to the FBI. This data is collected nationally on the seven reportable major crimes of *homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft*. The Charlestown Police Department compiles this information monthly via our records management system, then exports it to the Rhode Island State Police who in turn forward it to the FBI for analysis. The department's UCR data typically reflects a lower incidence of crime in specific categories than the agencies monthly activity report. This difference is due to the fact that the agency's monthly activity report reflects the "actual number of calls for service" generated in each of those categories as well as many others. Through the course of follow-up investigations, police clear many calls for service initially reported as crimes as "unfounded" or "non-reportable", these incidents do not make it onto the final monthly UCR report. Below you will find some UCR data for the years 2014 - 2019 inclusive. This data is helpful in tracking patterns and trends in major crime categories. In general, the overall reportable major crimes in town are low and some categories are trending downward.
